Lung Cancer Screening

Questions & Answers



Q: Am I a candidate for lung cancer screening?

A: If you:

- Are a current or former smoker
- Are in the age group from 50 to 77 years
- Have a smoking history of at least 20 pack-years (This means 1 pack a day for 20 years)
- Quit smoking less than 15 years ago and smoked one or more packs a day for 15 or more years
- Are NOT having any chest symptoms/lung cancer symptoms (cough, shortness of breath, chest pain)

O: What does the test include?

A: Lung screening includes a chest CT scan which is a rapid, non-invasive test that uses a low dose of radiation to provide 3-dimensional images of the lungs in a matter of seconds.

Q: What does it cost to have a CT scan for lung cancer? Will my insurance pay for it?

A: The cost is \$550.00. Medicare and most health insurance companies will cover the cost for a CT scan to screen for lung cancer every year if you meet the above requirements.

Talk to your provider today to see if Lung Cancer Screening is right for you. CT Scanning is available in the GMHC Imaging Department with a referral from your provider.
